### Army Corps extends time for VA DEQ to act on MVP 401 request

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has granted the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) an additional six months for it to act on a request for water quality certification for the new water crossings proposed for the Mountain Valley Pipeline. The <u>Corps' June 28 letter</u> set a deadline of December 31, 2021 by when DEQ must act to certify the new water crossings under section 401 of the Clean Water Act, deny such certification or waive certification. DEQ had requested a 245-day extension.

### Off-road vehicles on public lands: a growing issue in WV

Recent efforts in the West Virginia General Assembly to promote off-highway vehicles (ORVs) on public lands is a growing concern among conservation groups in West Virginia. In the 2021 session of the West Virginia General Assembly there were 8 bills and 2 resolutions introduced to promote the use of off-road vehicles on West Virginnia's public lands. While none of the measures passed, the shear number of legislative initiatives has focused attention on the issue.

West Virginia Highlands Conservancy (WVHC), a founding-member of ABRA, has taken a strong stand against opening up the National Forests, wildlife management areas and state parks and forests to such vehicles as motorcycles, motorized dirt bikes, all-terrain vehicles, snowmobiles, etc. Among reasons cited by WVHC for its concerns are:

- ORVs cause damage on public lands that require increased maintenance and repair
  of trails and other features of public lands, as evidenced at locations elsewhere in
  the United States where ORVs are allowed
- The effects of ORV use on soils, overall alter watershed functions and air quality are profound.
- Public lands should be places of rest, solitude and refuge. The noise and commotion associated with ORVs is incompatible with these characteristics of public lands.





• The negative effects of ORVs on vegetation and wildlife habitats are significant.

At WVHC's request, ABRA's Conservation Hub Advisory Committee agreed last week to accept as a study project issue the impact of ORVs on public lands. Information on the issue will in the future to the <u>Conservation Hub portion of the ABRA website</u>. #### Virginia certification of MVP water crossings still uncertain

The Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) has responded to a <u>May 13</u> request from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) as to whether DEQ intended to require for the Mountain Valley Pipeline a new certificate under section 401 of the Clean Water Act concerning the project's proposal to change the waterbody crossing method for the project at 120 stream or river crossings, more than half of which would be in Virginia. <u>DEQ's June 25 response</u> sort of "punted," noting that it was FERC's ultimate decision. Four-days before the DEQ response to FERC, on <u>June 21, 15 conservation groups</u> wrote <u>DEQ</u> arguing that it was the agency's responsibility under the law to require a new 401 certificate for the MVP's proposed stream crossings.

### New GAO report on pipeline safety released

The General Accountability Office (GAO), a research agency that is part of the U.S. Congress, released a new study last month on pipeline safety. *Performance Measures Needed to Assess Recent Changes to Hazardous Liquid Pipeline Safety Regulations* was released June 22. The GAO reports states:

"The U.S. hazardous liquid pipeline network runs for over 220,000 miles and is critical to the economy. Pipelines are considered a relatively safe way to transport crude oil and other hazardous liquids, but accidents can happen.

"The Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration amended safety regulations in 2019. Stakeholders told us the changes could improve safety without presenting significant challenges. However, several operators said they would need to modify or replace pipelines to accommodate certain inspection tools. The agency hasn't developed measures to assess whether the changes improve safety. We recommended doing so."
